As we celebrate the rescue that ARPA has achieved, we must also recognize the much larger impact that is happening, especially as a result of the law's state and local recovery funds. Two years later, we are only just beginning to see the full scope and impact of the \$350 billion investment that permeated every state and locality. Elected officials, from city councilmembers to governors, are utilizing the funds to build affordable housing, invest in workforce training, expand access to high-quality child care and more. The data points and testimonials detailed below highlight some of the tangible progress, primarily achieved over the past 12 months, that NewDEAL Leaders are creating throughout the country, utilizing ARPA funds to build lasting change in their communities.

These stories provide both a guide for state and local officials across the country as they continue their work to maximize the benefits of the Rescue Plan, as well as proof that ARPA is a blueprint for how government should respond in a crisis: investment in the biggest challenges facing our communities and a recognition of the role of state and local leaders on the ground to identify targeted, effective solutions.

Amid a long-running decline in faith in government's ability to help solve problems, states and localities have recognized the historic opportunity of ARPA and are making government work to improve the quality of life for everyone they represent.

## Maine

Nearly **150 family caregivers** have received grants of \$2,000 to help balance jobs with caregiving duties.

#### Boston, MA

All 21 members of the inaugural

PowerCorps program – which creates

pipelines into green jobs for historically
marginalized young people – have a new
green job or are enrolled in additional job
training.

#### **New Bedford, MA**

150 new housing units have been created for people with household incomes at or below the area median income.

#### Hartford, CT

Hartford's Youth Service Corps has provided 1,500 youth with opportunities to earn a paycheck while engaging in community service-based projects, such as lawn care services and snow removal for senior citizens. American Rescue Plan funds have helped grow the program, adding 100 participants per year to serve 350 people annually.

## Stamford, CT

The city of Stamford is using \$1.5 million of the city's American Rescue Plan Act money to create a grant program for small businesses that have taken a financial hit from the COVID-19 pandemic. It is expected to support 200 small businesses with grants of up to \$7,500 to help with payroll, commercial lease or mortgage payments, and other critical expenses.

#### Norwalk, CT

Connecticut's expansive free bus transportation service has been critical in fighting homelessness, addressing unemployment and increasing access to healthcare and human services.

#### Richmond, VA

The city of Richmond has opened multiple childcare centers, giving over 200 families access to affordable, high-quality childcare. They've also joined community partners to establish the first ever Positive Youth Development Fund, focused on increasing school attendance and preventing youth violence.

#### **Shelby County, TN**

Shelby County, TN, has established the Public Health Workforce & Infrastructure grant to train and retain its public health workforce. It also emphasizes recruiting a diverse workforce to address health inequities and disparities in the community.

#### Atlanta, GA

\$500,000 in housing subsidies for public safety personnel. The city hopes that this initiative will make careers with Atlanta police officers, firefighters, and corrections officers more appealing and lead to a higher retention rate.

## Columbus, OH

The city of Columbus used American Rescue Plan funds to maintain staffing levels for its Domestic Violence and Stalking Unit in the face of budget cuts. This has allowed them to continue their important work keeping families safe.

#### Scranton, PA

To help non-profits mitigate financial hardships precipitated by the pandemic, Scranton used \$1 million to award nearly 50 mental & behavioral healthcare non-profits with recovery grants.

## Pittsburgh, PA

To improve health and safety throughout the city, Pittsburgh has allocated \$18 million to replacing all lead waterlines. So far, they have replaced over 10,000 lead lines and have conducted 15 lead dust wipe inspections at city facilities.

## **Chester County, PA**

The county has awarded funding to 95 projects to address behavioral and mental health initiatives.

Projects include Chester County's 9-8-8 Mental Health Crisis Response system, mobile mental health crisis teams, and crisis stabilization centers.

#### Michigan

Pursuing the governor's goal to make preschool free for all 4-year-olds by 2027, the state is building 2,000 new classrooms.

#### **Grand Rapids, MI**

Grand Rapids's homeless outreach team has fostered relationships with nearly 7,000 individuals experiencing homelessness, providing resources, food, shelter, and substance abuse recovery.

Oakland80, the county's education and workforce development program, has connected with over 700 people and provided over 200 people with in-depth counseling, coaching, and education services.

#### Colorado

The state's "I Matter" program provides up to six free therapy sessions for Colorado youth. Since the program launched in 2021, more than 6,000 Colorado youth have received one or more free therapy sessions.

The city is using American Rescue Plan funds to transform the downtown and riverfront areas. This project increases pedestrian and bicycle access and provides more recreational spaces, including a community splash pad.

## Lincoln, NE

Lincoln invested \$1.2 million in utility grants to cover a year of electric and water payments for small businesses. As of February 2023, Lincoln has helped 160+ businesses which will not receive a utility bill for the rest of the year, allowing them to hire additional staff and complete maintenance that was deferred during the pandemic.

#### Dallas, TX

Dallas Real Time Rapid Rehousing (DRTRR) has rehoused 1,000 households and connected 1,500 individuals to social services. The program aims to provide families, unsheltered people, and survivors of domestic violence with quality, affordable housing.

## Phoenix, AZ

The American Rescue Plan helped create one of the city's most impactful programs, Feed Phoenix Food Program. So far, the program has helped deliver over 264,000 meals and provide 169,000 families with resources through food pantries.

Using funds from the American Rescue Plan, Travis County is building **2,000 new supportive** housing units that will also provide access to mental healthcare and work opportunities.

The city of Beaverton has given COVID Business Grants to 544 unique businesses to help them recover from the pandemic. 71% of all grants went to businesses with 5 employees or less, 64% of the grants went to BIPOCowned businesses, and 53% of the grants went to women-owned businesses.

To support childcare providers, the city of Boise distributed \$1,500 checks to 1,220 childcare workers. Providers have used the money to cover everything from supplies and operations expenses to medical bills and groceries.

The city council allocated over \$800,000 to support small business recovery and help entrepreneurs and new startups open storefronts in the city.
